

SCHOLAR CODE OF CONDUCT

School Year 2022-2023

The purpose of the Scholar Code of Conduct is to delineate the behaviors that impede our ability to provide an optimal learning environment for all students. An optimal learning environment is one that is free from disruption and distraction. In this document, specific problem behaviors are grouped into five levels based on severity. For each behavior level, there is a corresponding set of "behavior management strategies" that school personnel will use to address the problem behavior.

At SEED DC:

We focus on teaching social and emotional skills.
 We give scholars the opportunity to comply and demonstrate appropriate behaviors.
 We de-escalate conflict and give students opportunities to get it right.
 We give scholars a fresh start once the consequence has been applied and they have had an opportunity to reflect, learn, and restore.
